BULLYING PREVENTION MONTH

Dear LAS Families,

October is **Bullying Prevention Month** and for bullying prevention to work, everyone at school needs to be involved. Our staff has been trained on how to recognize and respond to bullying as well as how to use strategies that support a positive school and classroom climate. To further help our school be a safe and respectful place, we are going to use the <u>Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit</u>. In the lessons, students will learn how to:

- Recognize when bullying is happening
- Report bullying to a caring adult
- Refuse to let bullying happen to themselves or others
- · Be a bystander who stands up and is part of the solution to bullying

Our students will also be learning how to distinguish between behaviors that are mean versus rude versus bullying. These are the definitions students will learn:

Rude = Inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else

Rudeness might look like burping in someone's face, jumping ahead in line, or bragging about achieving the highest grade. On their own, any of these behaviors could appear as elements of bullying, but when looked at in context, incidents of rudeness are usually spontaneous, unplanned inconsideration, based on thoughtlessness, poor manners or narcissism, but not meant to actually hurt someone. These behaviors are also infrequent.

Mean = Purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone once (or maybe twice).

The main distinction between "rude" and "mean" behavior has to do with intention; while rudeness is often unintentional, mean behavior very much aims to hurt or depreciate someone. Kids are mean to each other when they criticize clothing, appearance, intelligence, coolness or just about anything else they can find to denigrate. Very often, mean behavior in kids is motivated by angry feelings and/or the misguided goal of propping themselves up in comparison to the person they are putting down. Commonly, meanness in kids sounds an awful lot like:

- "Are you seriously wearing that sweater again? Didn't you just wear it, like, last week? Get a life."
- "I hate you!"

Make no mistake; mean behaviors can wound deeply and adults can make a huge difference in the lives of young people when they hold kids accountable for being mean. Yet, meanness is different from bullying in important ways that should be understood and differentiated when it comes to intervention.

Bullying = Persistent, unwanted aggressive behavior that is intentionally hurtful towards another person and often involves an observed or perceived power imbalance.

Further, bullying is defined as the repeated use by one or more students of a written, verbal, or electronic expression or a physical act or gesture directed at an individual that:

- Emotionally or physically harms a student or damages the student's property
- · Causes a student to be in reasonable fear that he or she will be harmed
- · Creates a hostile environment for the student at the school
- · Infringes on the rights of a student at the school
- Has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of the daily classroom instruction or school environment

As our esteemed families we need your help, too! Get involved in making our school a safe and respectful place by letting us know if you hear about bullying at our school. Make sure your child knows to tell you or someone at school if he or she is being bullied. And give your child the clear message that it is never okay to bully others. We are asking students, staff, and families to wear orange on October 20th to show solidarity and stand up against bullying! Thank you for helping us make our school a safe, respectful place where everyone can learn.

Remember to wear ORANGE on OCTOBER 20TH!

However, the information on them about your child's academic progress remains the same as in past years. Our first progress reports of the year will be issued by the end of this week.
